Because only we know what is good for us – and not those mainstream vegetables!


Bananas don't belong to Germany. They can't stand our climate, anyway!

enjoying the sun!


None of them contains as much starch as the German potato, this simply makes us superior to all other vegetables!

In such dishevelled times, it needs a strong "Fuehrer" to be followed by all potatoes.


Exotic fruits don't belong in a good German fruit salad!




Right-wing extremism describes a political mind-set or movement that contains the following major elements more or less pronouncedly: ideologies of inequality, lack of freedom and violence.




You ought to look closer at the various ideologies, which are part of right-wing extremism. You best ask the other vegetable experts, they can help you further.

Nationalist ideologies glorify the own nation and consider it superior to others. Right-wing extremists often stand for nationalistic ideas by defining a nation by their »common« descent. With such nationalistic ideologies one can distance oneself from so called »foreigners« like for example refugees.





Yes, that is true. However, believing in »their« nation helps some people to ignore their own problems.

Because a nationalist attitude makes it easy to blame others for your own situation.







The concept of an **authoritarian society** endorses the limitation of democratic involvement and participation, in favour of a strong »Fuehrer«.



Yes, but there are people within the society who are not willing to take on any responsibility. They prefer an authoritarian regime that settles everything for them.


But decisions are good when reached and supported by as many as possible. If our tribe's leadership wants to make decisions without us, we openly discuss and question their ideas critically.








themselves as the sole advocates for »the people«. This is called **right-wing populism**.




Well that was a very educative journey and now I know rather a lot about right-wing ideologies.


If old Gunda is lashing out against foreigners again at our next family gathering, I will be able to enter into a discussion with her.





The corn, this fraudulent asylum seeker, is getting everything for free and even has a smartphone, while I can barely live off my small pension.
